- We did not do this on our own

FAMILY

- When TBI happens to a family member it affects the entire family
- It is overwhelming
- Not only dealing with the injured person but what each person is going through
 - + Shock, loss, grieving, resentment, anger, adjustment, fear, etc.
- Try to maintain as normal a life as possible
- You do your best

HOSPITAL & REHABILITATION

- * 8 weeks in Hamilton General Trauma & step down
- * Air ambulance to New Brunswick
- 5 Months in Moncton Hospital
- * 7 Months in Stan Cassidy Centre for Rehabilitation
- × April 14, 2006 = Home discharge
- × 5 years of additional rehabilitation to today

- Business relationship vs Marriage
- Time as a couple becomes a factor non existent
- Always something needing attention
- Exhaustion: physically and emotionally
- Important events take a back seat

Family suffers emotionally, physically, socially and economically

Our Dorchester home: 2 story, bedrooms and washroom facilities upstairs. Unsuitable as Kalika was living and toileting in the Living room on the main floor



CHAOS STRATEGIES

- Hired a Rehabilitation Consultant
- Reduce time away
 - asked for home interviews and meetings
 - held conference calls
 - Divided tasks by dividing into two
- * Hired people to help with household chores and home care

- It does not include the mileage driven by Kalika's OT, Speech Pathologist, Physio-therapist, Message Therapist, Psychologist or Case Manager to treat Kalika at home or attend Team Meetings.

RECOVERY

- NO or "We don't have the resources" were not options
- Creative and open minded people
- Work within and outside limited existing structures to find SOLUTIONS
- Challenge system if needed & work with own team
- Observe, listen, learn, think = do

PUSHING THE PLATEAU THEORY

- We found physical and cognitive challenges and stimulation = recovery advancement
- Alternated physical and cognitive activity
- Challenging and difficult activities pushed Kalika's limitations = results
- Pre-accident activities integrated into rehab program
